Within the department we are firmly committed to support the 260 police officers of our agency who sum up the courage to persevere in their jobs every day. In 2015 we invested heavily in training, intelligence and technology to equip officers with the tools they need to do their jobs well. We maintained partnerships with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies to capitalize on shared resources and provide additional support to our officers. We also upgraded our recruitment policies to attract the best applicants our community has to offer and assure that our tradition of excellence continues for the next generation.

In the community we remain committed to our citizens who play a critical role in helping the Department address problems. In 2015 we conducted five community forums and attended well over 100 neighborhood meetings to hear residents' concerns and exchange ideas for solutions to problems. We also invested in intelligence-led policing to gather data and develop responses to specific problems in various neighborhoods and business areas. Another major initiative was the restructuring of Beaumont Animal Services to more effectively address crimes against animals, reduce euthanasia rates and improve adoption services.

I am proud to serve as Chief of the Beaumont Police Department and am honored to work alongside the talented men and women of this agency to serve the community. Be assured that we always remain 'committed to serve and protect' and pledge to provide premiere law enforcement services 24 hours, seven days a week, year round.



FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Beaumont Police Department is committed to being a good steward of taxpayer dollars. Disciplined fiscal management is central to our operation and in 2015 we successfully administered year-round 24/7 police services at a cost below the amount budgeted by city leaders.

In Fiscal Year 2016 (beginning Oct 1, 2015 and ending September 30, 2016) the Beaumont Police Department budget is \$34,876,400. This is 29% of the City of Beaumont's total fund appropriations of \$118,583,300. The Police Department is the largest department in the City with 260 sworn personnel and 49 full-time civilian employees and is organized by five divisions.

Approximately 88% of the Department budget is expended on personnel salaries and benefits. Non-discretionary spending, such as fleet costs, technical services, and prisoner housing, consumes 9% of the Department budget. The remaining balance of 3% pays for department supplies, equipment and training.

The budget is managed by Budget Director, Lieutenant Kelvin Wilson.



Sworn Personnel of the Field Operations Division comprise 52% of the Department's budget and are Beaumont's first line of defense against the criminal element and other dangers.

They respond to calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week, year round.







COMMITTED TO SERVE AND PROTECT

CRIME & CLEARANCE RATES

Crime is a serious problem that creates challenges for every community. In 2015 the Beaumont Police Department presented 146 public safety workshops to address this problem and better inform citizens of situational awareness and other strategies that can reduce one's risk of being a victim of crime. 2015 statistics show that the City of Beaumont had a reduction of 12% in property crimes, but an unfortunate increase of 5% in violent crimes. We are pleased to report that BPD has maintained clearance rates well above the national average in both types of crime.

Underlying causes of crime can include issues like drug and alcohol abuse, untreated mental illness, unemployment and homelessness. We applaud steps taken by civic organizations, religious groups and the community to help address these issues and we pledge to support these efforts whenever possible.



Committed to Crime Prevention

The Beaumont Police Department recognizes the importance of providing education to citizens about crime prevention. In addition to 146 public safety workshops made in 2015, BPD also provided Rape Aggression Defense training for 70 women through our certified course.

Every citizen can reduce their risk of being a victim of crime. Stay aware of your surroundings and have a companion when possible. Lock doors and windows of your home and keep garage doors closed. Also lock your vehicle and remove valuables each time you leave it, even in the household driveway.

INTELLIGENCE-LED POLICING

Intelligence-led policing is a collaborative enterprise based on improved intelligence operations, community-oriented policing and problem solving. At the Beaumont Police Department, information sharing is crucial in our effort to combat and solve crime. One way we acquire and share information is through our collaborations with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies through numerous task forces. In 2015 eleven officers from the Police Department were dedicated to full time task force assignments. Our participation in these partnerships is a valuable investment in intelligence-led policing and proves to be a powerful tool to identify, dismantle and prosecute crime rings that might not otherwise be caught due to the complex, sensitive or resource-intensive nature of their investigations. The Department has current working relationships with the following agencies:



Several notable operations from 2015 include:

Felons in Possession of Firearms Crackdown: The Special Assignment Unit conducted an operation targeting felons in possession of firearms. More than 100 felony arrests were made as a result of this operation.

Police Impersonator Investigation: The Special Assignment Unit conducted an extensive investigation regarding a police impersonator in Beaumont's South End. With assistance from ATF and the Texas Rangers, this investigation led to the seizure of thirty four firearms, approximately 31,000 rounds of ammunition and a vehicle. The investigation also led to a public corruption case in Liberty County which is on-going.

N. 11th Street Crime Abatement Operation: The Special Assignment Unit and the Special Services Detail partnered with the Jefferson County District Attorney's Office to conduct a Crime Abatement Program targeting criminal activity and problem businesses in the North Eleventh Street Corridor. The 4 month investigation resulted in numerous arrests and had an extremely positive impact on that area.

Auto Theft Task Force: ATTF recovered 153 stolen vehicles valued at over 1.3 million dollars.



SPECIALIZED UNITS

Specialized Units support the Beaumont Police Department with specially trained law enforcement personnel and professional staff to address crime issues through proactive law enforcement measures.

K9 Unit

The Police Department's K9 Unit currently has five K-9's and a bloodhound. The unit is staffed with one sergeant and four officers. In 2015 the unit responded to 7,129 calls for service. Other notable statistics for the unit include:

SWAT and Hostage Negotiation Team

Twenty-two officers of the Police Department commit to extra training and physical fitness requirements to serve the SWAT team. Each member has regular duties within the Department and is on 24 hour call to assist officers in high threat situations. SWAT is supported by a nine person Hostage Negotiation Team that responds to all hostage or barricade situations. 90% of all calls responded to by this unit are brought to peaceful resolution.



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Special Assignment Unit

The Special Assignment Unit gathers and analyzes intelligence to identify and respond to high crime areas or crime patterns. In 2015 this Unit played an integral role in advancing the Department's intelligence-led policing initiative.

Bicycle Patrol Unit

This unit is a diverse tool used by the Department to provide nimble, on-the-ground patrol of parking areas in congested shopping centers, downtown Beaumont and large community events like the YMBL Fair.

COMMITTED TO SERVE AND PROTECT

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for the follow-up investigation of crimes that occur in the city limits of Beaumont. The goals of the division include the identification and arrest of guilty parties, recovery and return of property, and the submission of complete and properly prepared cases for prosecution. Property valued at \$2,425,209 was recovered due to the diligent efforts of investigators from this division.

Property Crimes Unit

The Property Crimes Unit is responsible for investigating cases where property is stolen or damaged. There are three units within Property Crimes. The Theft and Criminal Mischief Unit investigates crimes where property is stolen or damaged. The Burglary Unit investigates both residential and commercial burglaries where a building is entered without permission to commit theft or other offenses. The Financial Crimes Unit investigates offenses involving credit card abuse, identity theft and counterfeit or forged checks and currency.

Family Violence Unit

Family violence is a pervasive problem in every society. The Family Violence Unit of the Beaumont Police Department investigates cases involving domestic violence. Detectives work to help families break the cycle of domestic abuse/family violence and create safety plans for victims.

Cases Assigned in 2015: 2,778

Special Crimes Unit

The Special Crimes Unit is responsible for investigating all crimes committed against and by juveniles (ages 16 and under). They also investigate all sex crimes for both juvenile and adults and maintain the registration of sex offenders within the City of Beaumont. Digital forensic work done by the Special Crimes Unit was responsible for making a number of significant cases that resulted in the protection of children in danger: three cases of manufacturing child pornography | nine cases of distribution of child pornography | four cases of possession of child pornography | seven cases of enticement/online solicitation | two cases of obscenity to minor.

Narcotics/Vice Unit


The Narcotics/Vice Unit enforces narcotics, prostitution, gambling and firearms violations. The unit utilizes undercover buys of narcotics and surveillance of suspected offenders to develop criminal cases. In 2015 the unit worked with other State and Federal Law Enforcement agencies to achieve its goals, resulting in 300 arrests and the seizure of illegal drugs, weapons and US Currency in excess of \$185,200.

Cases Assigned or Initiated in 2015: 563

Crime Scene Unit (ID)

The ID Unit is a valuable tool for the Beaumont Police Department. Six highly trained civilian crime scene technicians, supervised by a Sergeant, work closely with CID detectives to document and aid in the investigation of criminal offenses. They also house the regional AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Information System) terminal.

Persons Crimes Unit

The Persons Crimes Unit investigates crimes against people, age 17 and older. These crimes include assault, kidnapping, homicide, threats, harassment and robbery.

Cases Assigned in 2015: 2,080



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FIELD OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Field Operations Division is the largest division of the Beaumont Police Department and has an authorized strength of 159 police officers.

Patrol Watches

The Field Operations Division consists of four patrol watches that provide service 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to approximately 118,500 citizens in the City of Beaumont in addition to tens of thousands commuters who travel to and through the city every day.

Officers patrol an area of 85 square miles and cover over 750 miles of roadway within the city, including Interstate 10 and Highway 69. In 2015 officers responded to or initiated more than 191,740 citizen contacts through calls for service and pro-active patrol activities.

Field Training Program

The Field Training Program is designed for new graduates of the police academy and provides a six-month field training orientation. During this period, each new officer has an opportunity to learn from an experienced Field Training Officer (FTO) who is specially selected and trained. FTO's have the dual responsibility of providing police service on their assigned patrol shift, as well as training and evaluating new officers. In 2015, 12 new officers benefitted from field training provided by 24 FTOs.



Traffic Unit

The Traffic Unit is responsible for the enforcement of traffic laws, investigation of all traffic fatalities and follow up investigation of hit and run crashes. In addition to other projects in 2015, the unit planned and conducted two multi-county warrant round-up operations. Statistics for 2015 include:

The Traffic Unit received a new fleet of motorcycles in 2015, replacing the old fleet of Harley Davidson motors with new 1200 RT-P BMW motorcycles. Officers of the motor unit report that the BMWs are fast and easy to maneuver in traffic.

ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

The Administration Division works to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the Police Department by providing support services to both operations and mission critical activities of the agency. Units that operate in Administrative capacities include:

- Training & Personnel
- Internal Affairs
- Records Unit
- Resource Unit
- Property Unit
- Honor Guard & Rifle Team

Training & Personnel

Training is the most critical exercise taken within the Beaumont Police Department. We understand that training hones skills and develops professionalism. Therefore, we commit to go above and beyond the minimum training requirements set forth by state TCOLE standards. The Training & Personnel Unit offers a wide variety of basic and advanced training courses ranging from Human Trafficking, to Use of Force, to Cultural Diversity and Conflict Resolution. All told, over 105 topics were covered in the various classes and skills training made available to police officers. The Police Department Firearms Range is also managed by this unit. In 2015 the Training Unit facilitated 14,393 hours of training to 1,012 officers, which includes both firearms range and classroom courses.

Internal Affairs

The Internal Affairs Unit of the Police Department investigates complaints filed against the Department by citizens. All complaints submitted to the Department must be issued in writing and signed by the complainant. The unit is also responsible for investigating all incidents involving use of force, vehicle accidents and administrative complaints. Any corrective action recommended as the result of an Internal Affairs investigation is implemented and monitored by supervisors.

Records Unit

The Police Department Records Unit processes, files and maintains all police reports, including accident reports, and generates the monthly Uniform Crime Report filed with the Department of Justice. Additionally, the unit manages our Tele-Serve reporting function and in 2015 completed 1,539 offense reports, issued 177 case numbers for protective orders and 123 trespass affidavits. Filing records requests and subpoenas is another crucial function of the unit and approximately 11,000 requests were filled in 2015.

Property Unit

The Property and Evidence Unit is responsible for the security and preservation of evidence that has been recovered as a result of a criminal investigation. The unit is also responsible for the storage and disposal by court order of found property as well as the safekeeping of property where the owner is known. In addition, they maintain all uniforms and accessories needed for the Department's 260 sworn personnel. On average, the unit has care and custody of over 15,000 items.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Beaumont Police Department provides oversight and coordination for the City's Emergency Management program and the Emergency Operations Center (EOC). In 2015, Emergency Management played a vital role in keeping the City prepared for a coordinated response to major events, emergencies and disasters. That coordination involved all five phases of emergency management, to include: prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery.

A large focus for 2015 was preparedness, which included maintaining Emergency Management Plans for the City and 22 primary annexes, along with facilitating State approval of each plan. During 2015 five of the 22 primary annexes were submitted and approved by the State. This division also participated in a regional partnership with the US Department of Homeland Security on a state initiative to develop a response plan for IED involvement in a mass casualty incident.

Beaumont Emergency Management also managed accountability for the National Incident Management System and trained over 1,500 employees and more than 1,000 additional people in the region. Over 30 courses were provided at Beaumont's EOC and other sites. These courses are necessary to maintain State and Federal grant and reimbursement funding. Beaumont Emergency Management currently manages 64 grants. Among grant funds received in 2015 were \$16,000 in match for our BlackBoard Notification System and \$30,000 for a License Plate Reader Project that resulted in drastic gains on Warrant Roundup recovery.

OEM also played an important role in organizing major events in 2015 including the Gusher Marathon, Gift of Life Color Run and the Cops & Kids Carnival, among several others.



ANIMAL SERVICES

2015 was a banner year for Beaumont Animal Services with restructuring of the department to improve both enforcement and adoption services. With the addition of a new manager hired for the shelter and the expansion of part time positions to full time positions, the shelter was able to increase adoption rates 48% and increase donations to the shelter over 400%. Fund raising was improved with several new initiatives, most notable being the first Annual BAS Giving Tree that was dedicated in the police station lobby during the holidays, as well as the Blue Santa Adoption Day. With guidance from the BAS Advisory Committee of volunteers appointed by City Council, the animal shelter now provides more comprehensive adoption services with animals receiving better medical treatment while in our custody and care.

In addition to animal adoption, Beaumont Animal Services is also responsible for enforcing city ordinances related to animals and eliminating nuisances and threats to the public that result from animals running at large or kept in unsafe conditions. Restructuring at BAS resulted in the enforcement unit having a dedicated supervisor which resulted in an increase of stray, ill or rabid animals captured or quarantined to keep citizens safe.

Bringing animal abusers to justice is another priority for Beaumont Animal Services and in 2015 BAS joined forces with Crime Stoppers and the Jefferson County District Attorney's office to launch a fight against animal abuse crimes.

Public Safety Presentations

Educating citizens about personal safety and crime prevention is an important part of pro-active police work. In 2015 the PCR Unit conducted 145 public safety workshops. Topics covered included, identity theft, personal safety, and active shooter threat.

Citizen Training Programs

The PCR Unit conducts a variety of training courses available to citizens who are interested in how law enforcement works, who may be considering a career in law enforcement or who seek opportunities to volunteer in Police Department projects. In 2015 the PCR Unit conducted the following citizen training programs:

- Citizen's Police Academy (CPA): 58 graduates
- Citizens in Action (CIA): 38 active members
- Clergy and Police Partnerships (CAPP): 24 members
- Practicum in Policing (PIP): 23 LIT Criminal Justice Students

Cops & Kids Program

Cops and Kids Beaumont is a proactive initiative of the Department that promotes personal safety, crime prevention, leadership, ethics and civic duty for area youth. Major activities in 2015 include:



Bicycle Safety Rodeo: Co-sponsored by Dishman Elementary PTA, 315 attendees.

Cops & Kids Carnival: 3,900 attended, includes children and parents.

Trunk-or-Treat & Haunted Jail: 4,200 trick-or-treaters and their parents attended.

Santa in Blue: 82 families and 310 children received gifts of toys, food and clothing.

Beaumont Police Explorers - Post 730: 14 scouts, boys and girls age 14 - 20. Post 730 won numerous awards at state regional competitions. The team also facilitated McGruff appearances 18 times and volunteered hundreds of hours at many community events.

YALE Academy (Youth and Law Enforcement): 11 Academy graduates.

Beaumont Police Station Museum student tours: 33 tours and 212 visitors (school, scouting, civic and church youth groups).

School Reading Project (kindergarten thru second grade): four BISD elementary schools participate in the reading project. BPD conducted 42 sessions, serving 1,200 students.

WE REMEMBER

2015 Memorial Ceremony

There were 128 federal, state, and local law enforcement officers who lost their lives in the line of duty during 2015. 12 Texas Peace Officers died. In May 2015, the Beaumont Police Department held the 2015 Southeast Texas Police Officer Memorial Ceremony at the site of the station's Police Officers' Memorial Star to honor our fallen brothers and sisters. Upon the Memorial Star rests 17 badges, one for each officer killed in the line of duty in the history of the Department.

Our Police Officers' Memorial is an important symbol of the ultimate sacrifices made by our fallen brothers and sisters...it is a symbol that keeps their memories alive and provides inspiration to our officers every day.



COMMUNITY PARTNERS



Beaumont Police Officers Association

The Beaumont Police Officers Association is the local association representing the officers of the Beaumont Police Department in all contract negotiations of wages, benefits and contract disputes. The BPOA is a member of and provides legal aid through the Combined Law Enforcement Associations of Texas (CLEAT) for its members. The BPOA currently represents 100 percent of the sworn officers of the department.
